





INSIGHT REPORT SUMMER 2023 DELIVERY



This report provides a formative evaluation of the Fit, Fed and Fun (FFF) programme delivery that took place in Summer, 2023.

It builds on evidence already acquired as part of the ongoing FFF programme, including the experiences of young people taking part, their parents, carers, and guardians.

Following the established evaluation approach, data were analysed for descriptive statistics and to identify main themes in the qualitative feedback.




## Main finalings

#### Participation data

- In total, 3,775 attendances were recorded across the programme (a total of 97 camps) during August 2023, the average attendance across all delivery sites being 38.9 (see Figures 1 and 2).
- Ospreys recorded the highest total (n=1,045, average attendance 58.1 young people across 18 camps). This marks a notable increase compared with Easter '23 (i.e., 24% of total compared with 14%).
- Scarlets recorded the lowest (n=529, average attendance 33.1 young people across 16 camps). RGC ran the most sessions (n=25).

   have participated in FFF during

- 1,536 and 3,540 attendances were recorded across the programme during August 2022 and April 2023 respectively. Thus, including 2022 participants, FFF has so far engaged 8,851 young people (not including multiple attendances by single participants) during Easter and Summer Holiday Periods

Figure 1: Attendance for regions (n)




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Overall summary of feedback

- 1. FFF continues to provide an innovative and important opportunity to engage young people in a safe space to enjoy being physically active, meeting others and making new friends.
- 2. Learning new skills and knowledge, free access, and the provision of food are distinct features of the programme and participants value the opportunity to attend sessions at nearby and reputable facilities.

- 3. Overall, participants feel more confident and rate programme delivery highly.
- 4. In general, parents are able to divert time to other commitments, safe in the knowledge that their children are cared for in a professional and well managed environment.

# Main finalings

- Consideration of a broader array of activities within sessions would likely increase registrations and enable a more diverse population to attend.
- There is a need to focus on maintaining and improving the quality of communication across programme delivery.
- Wider family engagement could provide opportunities to increase the appeal and reach of FFF.

- An opportunity exists to increase the quality of communication and information concerning the camps to further reassure those taking part particularly in respect of welfare and safeguarding issues.
- Stronger emphasis of delivering simple, impactful, and educational messaging around environmental awareness and connections to the Sustainable Development Goals should be considered in order to build on successes to date.

### Perspectives from Participants and Parents / Guardians

- 1. Fun and enjoyment continue to be a principal driver of delivery and a clear factor in participant experience. Young people feel excited to interact with others, make new friends, develop skills through a variety of engaging activities, and acquire new knowledge.
- 2. FFF appears to be consolidating its reputation as a trusted deliverer of activity camps.

  Organisation and processes have been refined and improved over time so that very few operational issues are now surfacing. Where these issues do arise, they tend to relate to communication, advertising and booking problems.
- 3. Delivery at local venues continues to be an essential part of FFF's success. Continuing to work with local partners to identify appropriate facilities to support the engagement of as many young people as possible remains a priority.
- 4. Parents value the time made available to them when children participate and feel confident that the sessions are delivered by a trusted and expert team.
- 5. Children come away feeling happy and energized, with some having greater confidence, feeling socially connected, and developing a wider range of tastes and interests with respect to physical activity and sport.
- 6. In the participant at surveys, strong responses speak directly to the types of impacts FFF is seeking to achieve including 'I know about healthy eating', 'I feel confident to try new things', 'I feel close to other people', 'I am tolerant and respectful of others' and 'I feel fully mentally alert'

### Headlines from Summer 2023 Site Visits

- FFF is supporting the physical and mental wellbeing of participants while providing clear opportunities for social inclusion and community belonging
- Young people were fully engaged with activities, and coaching staff facilitated an inclusive environment that ensured that participants remained 'on task' at all times.
- Feedback from WRU staff indicated that working on Fit Fed Fun is among the most enjoyable aspects of their job, enabling them to support community inclusion through sport.

- Having an understanding of local issues, local need, and having prior connections with the targeted young people is essential.
- Stakeholders valued a partnership approach to organising and delivering sessions – as a strategic response to declining budgets for community sport across Wales; for efficiency of delivery and to provide greater access to training.
